Mandatory Accident Insurance

Concordia College now requires every student who carries 7 credits or more to have accident insurance. This insurance is provided by the college for \$20 each quarter.

In the past, some students did not keep up with their premiums, others were dropped, and some had inadequate coverage. Therefore, the college administration found it no longer practical to enforce a policy of required health insurance.

However, accident insurance is now required due to a number of uncovered accidents on and off campus such as athletics, work, motor vehicle, and physical. Previously an uncovered accident could only be covered by filing a lawsuit against the college which subsequently raises everyone else's tuition.

By making this insurance mandatory the college will receive a group rate. There is no deductible and a student need only file a claim to receive reimbursement. Next year the college will include this fee in the financial aid need.

Watch that paper soar.





No Smoking in Tier 0
