After the intial setbacks, the Comets came up with an impressive 7-2 victory over St. Teresa in Winona. #3 singles player Elizabeth Leckband and #4 singles player Sheri Anderson both played tough 3 set matches and both came up winners. Leckband's scores were 6-7, 6-5, 6-4, and Anderson's were 3-6, 7-6, 6-2. A week later St. Teresa visited Concordia where our own Comets handed all six of their singles' players straight set losses. The singles shut-outs combined with double victories by Jane Wilkins and Diana Potratz at #1, and Anderson and Leah Jessesski at #3 gave the Comets an 8-1 victory in the meet.

The Comets finished the regular season with a 4-5 loss to DMLC. In that meet #1 Wilkins won a 7-6, 7-6 heartstopper. Number three Leckband once again came up a winner in a 3 set marathon 6-3, 1-6, 6-2, and Freshman Deb Herrmann added a commanding 6-4, 6-2 victory. Wilkins and Potratz rounded out the win column with a 6-4, 6-4 victory at the No. 1 doubles spot.

The Comets ended their season on Saturday, April 30th at the conference tournament at DMLC in New Ulm. After 7 hours of tennis the Comets had produced two conference champions -Potratz at #2 singles, and Wilkins and Potratz at #1 doubles.
