They finished the 2019 season with a 33-20 overall record, a 19-11 conference record, and placed 6th at conference. Last year, the team hit .309, which is the third-highest in program history. Golden Bears Men's Basketball Update

he Golden Bears men's basketball team has had a roller-coaster season. With their current 6-14 overall record and 4-12 conference record, the men have been battling for some wins. After a three-game win streak in early January, the men have now lost the past seven games, most recently losing by 13 to MSU Moorhead. So far, the men have recorded wins against North Central, Northland, Southwest Minnesota State (twice), UMary, and Minot State.

Recently, the men played Wayne State and lost 63-66. Leading the game was junior Jacob Shields with 15 points. Before Wayne State, the men lost 54-81 to Augustana, 92-101 to Minnesota State Duluth, 90-100 to St. Cloud State, and 59-74 to Sioux Falls. Leading the games were senior Max Keefe with 13 points, junior Jordan Coblin with 27 points, Coblin again with 28 points, and tying with 13 points junior Cody Carlson, senior Perion Little, and junior Lee Higgins. Though they have struggled to get into the win column recently, the majority of their losses have been fairly close games, proving the team's potential for the rest of the season.

Even though the team has been in a rut, they had a strong three-game win streak on January 3rd, 4th, and 10th. They beat UMary 79-65 with junior Lee Higgins scoring 20 points. Junior Jordan Coblin scored 26 points during their 71-68 win against Minot State. Finally, the team won 79-70 against Southwest Minnesota State, Coblin leading with 22 points.

The men's team has had many transitions to work through this season, the biggest being their new head coach, Eric Johnson. Johnson has been the top assistant for the men since 2014 and also was an assistant at the University of South Dakota before his arrival here. Not only did the team have to adjust to a new form of leadership, but they also added ten newcomers to their team this year. With only five returners, the team contains one senior, three juniors, two sophomores, six transfers, and four freshmen. The men have been working hard to play as a team and have proved their abilities with a 5-4 home record and an average of 73.4 points per game.

The men still have six more games to improve their overall record. They have four more home games, February 7th against Bemidji State, February 14th against Minnesota Crookston, February 21st against Winona State, and February 22nd against Upper Iowa.
