Concordia Comets Open Play

Soccer coach Sig Satzinger and his Comets are looking for more victories in their remaining games: Oct. 15 against Dr. Martin Luther College, there; Oct. 22, Pillsbury, there; Oct. 25, U of M, there; and Oct. 29, Bethany at Concordia.

Coach Bob Barnes is preparing for the basketball season which begins Nov. 29 against Dr. Martin Luther College. Coach John Chiapuzio is getting his team ready for the wrestling season which begins Dec. 3, when Concordia takes on Metropolitan State.

The Concordia College Comets have played the two opening conference games of their soccer season. The first game with Dr. Martin Luther College Sept. 24, proved the Lancers to be too much for the Comets when the former won 4-2.

The sun shone again on the Comets after their 2-0 victory against Pillsbury Oct. 1. Concordia's goals were scored by Ralph Thompson and Bob Zscherer, who was assisted by Ted Phillips. Goalie Bruce Stam played a fine game.

The bright spot for Concordia was co-captain Ty Hamilton. Ty gained half of Concordia's yardage, an 85 yd. kick-off return, 15 tackles and 4 assists.

Concordia Adopts ACT as Mandatory for Admission

A change in the admissions policy has been enacted for the freshman class of 1967. The American College Testing Program (ACT) will be a mandatory requirement for enrollment at Concordia.

The ACT tests, given at 1,500 test centers (colleges and some high schools) will be offered in Oct., Dec., Feb. and May. Students interested in coming to Concordia in the fall of 1967 should consult their high school counselors at once concerning the details for the ACT test. The registration period for the test given on Dec. 10, 1966 will close on November 19. Each high school counselor's office can supply all of the details concerning procedures for the required test.
