CSP Track Athletes Wrap Up Indoor Season

HILE THE YEAR HAS CERTAINLY been different, the Golden Bears track team still had a solid indoor season. The team traveled all over the midwest, having six meets prior to the indoor conference meet at the end of February. The team started the season travelling to Maryville Missouri for the Mel Tjeerdsma Classic, then traveled to Mankato, Topeka (κs), Fargo (ND), back to Mankato, and finally to South Dakota State University.

The team has been battling continuously throughout the season with many athletes achieving personal bests and breaking school records. Starting off the season strong was Arika Robinson, who broke the high jump school record, and Josh Sims who broke the 600 yard school record. Both were achieved at the first meet of the season in Missouri.

Following the strong start, Kara Lindberg broke the previous 5000m school record in Topeka with a time of 17:45. The next week in Fargo, Lucia Mesfin broke the school record in the 3000m with a time of 10:20. Finally, in Mankato, Christian Davis broke the school record in the long jump with a jump of 7.32m. Not only did the jump break the record, but it placed Davis at the top of the conference list and currently places him seventh in the nation. Impressively, this mark came in his first ever collegiate meet.

The incoming freshmen have had a strong impact on the team as well. A select amount of the team will be traveling to South Dakota State University on February 20th for one last attempt to qualify for the conference meet (February 26th-27th). As the season comes to a close the following weekend with the indoor conference meet, the Bears are looking to finish the season strong.
